Born and raised in Seoul, South Korea, Shin-hee Chin received her BFA and MFA from Hong-lk University. Shortly after, she immigrated to the United States with her husband and raised two kids while earning her MA in Fiber Arts from California State University at Long Beach. As an educator for 15 years, Chin has taught drawing, painting, color theory, and mixed media at Tabor College in Kansas. She was elected as Distinguished Faculty at Tabor College in 2008.

Her work has been exhibited nationally and internationally, including the Textile Museum at Washington DC, Metropolitan Art Museum, Tokyo, Japan, the Palais des Nations (United Nations' headquarters building), Geneva, Switzerland, and Uijeongbu Arts Center, Seoul, South Korea. She recently has a solo exhibition, entitled *Embracing Identity in Diaspora*, at the Seoul Arts Center in 2019.

Shin-hee Chin's work was featured as the cover of the *Studio Art Quilt Associates Journal* (Spring 2017) and the cover of *Surface Design Association Journal* (summer 2014). She was selected as research fellow of Nagel Institute for the Study of World Christianity at Calvin College, participating in a seminar on Contemporary Chinese Art and Society held in Beijing, Shanghai, and Nanjing in 2018. She has won numerous awards including: Judge's Award and Publisher's Award, Quilt Nihon, Tokyo, Japan (2018, 2014, & 2010): Most Innovative Use of the Medium Award, Quilt National, Athens, Ohio (2013).

- Conference attendees may submit up to 3 items. (NO FEE FOR FASHION SHOW ENTRIES)
- All items must be made by the entrant and may not have been shown at previous KAWS or MOFA conferences.
- A labeled photo of each entry must be submitted (via email) with the entry form. Photos should be minimum 300 DPI.
- Modeling of your own garment is encouraged, but not required.

Accommodation & Meals

Lodging Facilities

We have two lodging options available to us at Lake Doniphan: The Main Lodge and Mini Lodge South. You will choose your conference lodging preference on the registration page. If attending the Pre-Conference workshops, only the Main Lodge will be utilized.

The Main Lodge are semi-private sleeping rooms each have two double beds and a full bathroom. Linens and towels are provided. Please note that the dining hall is in this building which may be advantageous to some. You will have the opportunity to request a roommate on the registration page.

The Mini Lodge South rooms will accommodate 4 guests per room and are equipped with bunkbeds in an open concept. (Only the bottom bunks will be utilized!!). Bathroom facilities are one per every 4 guests. Linens and towels are NOT provided. They can be rented for \$10.00 per set, or you may provide your own twin sheets, pillow case, blanket, and towels. You do not need a roommate if staying at the Mini Lodge.

Meals

Meals will be provided on-site in the Main Lodge dining hall with the following schedule: breakfast 7:30 a.m.-8:30 a.m., lunch 12:00 noon-1:00 p.m., dinner 5:30 p.m.-6:30 p.m. All food is created by the Lake Doniphan kitchen team with the best interests of their guests in mind. The team is equipped to accommodate most special dietary requests including vegan, vegetarian, gluten free, dairy-free. All special dietary needs MUST be requested in ADVANCE on the registration form.

Meals are served cafeteria style with one entrée offered at each meal. Fruit, yogurt, and hot cereal will also be available at each breakfast. Lunch and dinner entrées will be served alongside a full salad bar.

In addition, located in the Main Lodge dining hall is a 24-hour beverage bar including: brewed tea, hot tea, coffee (plus decaf), hot chocolate, lemonade, juice.

The Intuitive Stitch: Discovering A Mindful Stitching Practice

Christine Mauersberger

Pre-Conference – Thursday and Friday - 9:00am – 4:00pm with a break for lunch

Do you take walks and take inspirational photographs and wonder how to translate this into your stitching? Would you like to understand how to be using your intuitions for stitching projects? Do you want to learn how to connect to your creative self to allow for your own vision to come forth in your work? The workshop is based on Christine's own studio practice in which she uses photographs, drawing, and thinking as a tool to inform an intuitive style of hand stitching. You will be guided through exercises to translate what you see, think, or dream into hand stitched work.

Note: Students must know a few basic stitches. At the minimum: Running stitch. If you want to do other stitches please, practice several weeks **BEFORE** the workshop, such as French knot and Stem stitch. Both of these simple stitches are nice, but do require a little practice and need more time than what is covered in class.

About Christine:

Christine Mauersberger is known for her hand stitched work that evokes singular moments in time. She uses the form of the humble stitch as a tool for inward as well as outward expression of her inner life and as a message to the external world.

Supply List/What to bring:

- Bring a small sampling (1 to 4) of your own stitched items These will be shared with the group to help each of us gain a sense of community, sharing, and mutual respect.
- o Fabrics -18" x 18" square pieces of linen or similar fabric. 2 white, 2 natural, 2 black
 - If you do not have linen, then use similar fabric, meaning that the fabric should be easy to stitch into. Some cotton fabrics that are used for quilting are not easy to use for hand sewing and you will not be happy when your hand begins to hurt.
 - Bring Extra fabric that feels good in your hands & that is easy to stitch into. I like to use linen, but cotton, vintage cloth napkins, tea towels, and other vintage linens are nice.
- Embroidery floss Bring what you like to use. It can be 6 strand embroidery floss, or perle cotton. Please bring what you feel most comfortable using.

- o Embroidery needles, pins and a pin cushion
- o **Needles -** Bring appropriately sized needles for the type of thread you are using
- o **Thimble -** Bring one if you use one.
- o **Scissors** Embroidery scissors are nice for snipping small threads.
- Embroidery hoop(s)
 - Bring an embroidery hoop that you are used to using. Please do not buy a new hoop that you are not familiar with. Christine will have a "few" extra 7" Clover brand hoops for people to borrow. She prefers these because they tighten up nicely. Inexpensive, spring-like hoops do not work as well.
- Notebook for drawing/doodling and Drawing and Marking Pens/Pencils
 - Bring a small selection of pens, pencils, or markers any or combination of those tools for use when drawing/doodling in a journal or notebook.

Expanding Your Boundaries with Saori: From Mild to Wild!

Pre-Conference – Thursday and Friday - 9:00am – 4:00pm with a break for lunch

This class will be a fun exploration of various weaving techniques that can be incorporated into your Saori-style projects. On the first morning, play with color and texture. Then, add more texture and more color. Once you are warmed up and loosened up, we'll begin experimenting with more adventurous techniques to create exotic woven cloth. On Day 2, test the boundaries of SAORI's "no rules" claim with some unusual techniques designed to challenge the way you think about weaving.

This is a technique-based class and students will leave with a piece of cloth that journals their weaving exploration. This cloth will be suitable for many things when it is completed but during class you will be weaving without intent (no pre-planning of what this cloth will become). Although designed with experienced weavers in mind, this class is appropriate for all levels including beginners.

About Sarah:

After being introduced to Saori weaving, everything made sense to Sarah. Each project is unique, and each day weaving is a new chance to explore, create, and simply enjoy the process. Sarah has taken every opportunity to learn and grow in her Saori practice. In early 2014, she was accepted to become a registered Saori instructor. She continues to learn new methods and techniques, traveling as far as Japan to study with Kenzo Jo at Saori no Mori.

Supply List/What to bring:

- Loom* ** (see information below)
- Scissors
- Cell phone or camera to take pictures as you work (and/or pencil and paper if you prefer to take notes)
- An open mind and willingness to try the unusual
- Although weaving materials will be provided, students may bring yarn, ribbons, fabric or other items they would like to try in the weaving.

^{*}For students who cannot bring in their own looms, the instructor will have 6 Saori floor looms available (by prior reservation at registration) for use during the class.

**If student is bringing their own loom:

- Floor, Table, and Rigid Heddle looms are all acceptable however some techniques will be limited or less effective on a rigid heddle loom.
- Loom should be warped with an approximately 6-yard long warp (shorter is ok on rigid heddle looms or for slow weavers).
- Suggested warp: 150 thread ends in a 12 epi sett. Recommended warp is 10/2 or 8/2 cotton in a single color.
- Warp for plain weave.
- Students bringing their own looms should also bring shuttles/bobbins for their loom.

<u>Introduction to the Intuitive Stitch</u>

Saturday Full Day - 9:00am-4:00pm with a break for lunch

There is something enchanting about hand-stitching. We are drawn to stitch and can almost feel the vitality of the person who created the sewn marks. The purpose of this workshop is to guide you through lively exercises for making your own work in a spontaneous and fresh manner. Join Christine as she guides you through several surprisingly fun stitching exercises to enhance your own stitching practice. She will refresh your skills by explaining basic stitches, threading a needle, and how to handle your embroidery thread. This is a nice kick-start session for building a meditative and purposeful style of hand- stitching. We will move fast in this class.

Note: Students must know a few basic stitches. At the minimum: Running stitch. If you want to do other stitches please, practice several weeks **BEFORE** the workshop, such as French knot and Stem stitch. Both of these simple stitches are nice, but do require a little practice and need more time than what is covered in class.



A Hands-On Saori Primer: Techniques & Philosophy

Are you curious about this new trend in weaving called SAORI? You may have heard that it is a no-rules weaving style or free-style weaving. While that is true, SAORI is so much more than those simple phrases can convey. In this class you will start with weaving, learn how Saori started, and learn various techniques for creating interesting and colorful cloth. We will discuss the guidelines for a Saori journey. As you weave without intent, you will learn how your cloth can communicate with others. Weave, play, and let your heart control the artistry flowing from your hands. Your class will end with a piece of cloth that shows you have seen "with eyes that shine," and that is just the beginning. This class is suitable for all levels.

After being introduced to Saori weaving, everything made sense to Sarah. Each project is unique, and each day weaving is a new chance to explore, create, and simply enjoy the process. Sarah has taken every opportunity to learn and grow in her Saori practice. In early 2014, she was accepted to become a registered Saori instructor. - Suggested warp: 150 thread ends in a 12 epi sett. Recommended warp is 10/2 or 8/2 cotton in a single color. Reeds/heddles other than 12 dent are fine just size your warp yarn appropriately to the reed.
- Warp for plain weave.
- Students bringing their own looms should also bring shuttles/bobbins for their loom.

Eco-Dyeing and Using Organic Materials

Learn to print flowers and natural materials on fabric, without using synthetic dyes! Covered in class will be the preparation/mordanting of the fabric so that it is receptive to natural materials. Learn to wrap the fabric with flowers and plant materials, steam set and then wash it. Flower pounding on paper will also be explored; results always unexpected and wonderful. These papers can then be used for greeting cards, book binding, and collage. We will work with silk and cotton fabrics and good quality papers. Participants will be provided with 2 yards of fabric (silk and cotton), fresh flowers, paper, and dye supplies. Before the end of class, Valerie will also do a rust dyeing demo, something that participants can do at home.

About Valerie:

Valerie has spent many years exploring resist dyeing methods such as shibori, tie dye, batik, Japanese paste resist and more. Valerie is a fine art educator, teaching at the college level, at the Ghost Ranch Conference and Education Center in New Mexico and classes are offered for all ages and abilities. She has a BFA from the Kansas City Art Institute and a MFA from the University of Michigan. She continues to be active in the local and regional art scene including having served as the Vice President of the Best of Missouri Hands organization.

Supply List/What to bring:

Bring flowers, strong quilting or heavy-duty upholstery thread or thin strong twine (jute is good), scissors, hammer, small plastic cutting board, and earplugs.

Boro Cloth-inspired Nuno Felt Collage Wall Hanging

Make a wall hanging using sheer fabrics and merino wool combined by felting them together. This will be a fun intuitive class playing with color patchwork and learning the basics of making nuno felt. The class will involve standing and some moderate physical activity.

About Lisa:

Lisa Hinrichs is a fiber and mixed media artist living in St. Louis, Missouri. After years of learning through experimentation and seeking out talented teachers in the art community, Lisa now spends her days making art in a studio overlooking the Missouri River where she is a juried studio artist at the Foundry Art Centre. Lisa holds a BS in Architectural Design from the University of Missouri and later studied Graphic Design at SLCC. While she has moved on from earlier careers in architecture and graphic design, her love of a well-designed structure or elegantly composed page find their way into her current work. Lisa's work can be viewed at various exhibitions or at her studio in the Foundry Art Centre.

Supply List/What to bring:

- A mixture of dyed sheer fabric pieces in a color palette you love, suggestions include: 5mm silk paj (habotai), 3 or 4mm silk chiffon, up-cycled sheer (esp. silk) fabrics from clothing including lace pieces. I will have some fabric for sale at the workshop but try to bring some fabric that you probably already have.


